## WHO IS CALLING US, SAVING US AND SHARING HIS GLORY WITH US?

**17<sup>th</sup> Sunday, Year A 2020**

**Fr Mark writes:**

*Who is calling us, saving us and sharing his glory with us?  
(The answer's Jesus Christ, the Lord)*

Saul was a good Pharisee. He had been taught exceptionally well and had been exemplary in keeping the precepts and traditions of his ancestors, that is of the Law or Covenant given to Moses on Mount Sinai. In this light, we can even, perhaps, understand his approval of the death of St. Stephen. The message which Stephen had been preaching seemed to undermine the teaching of the Law. Saul at that time thought this could mislead people into thinking that there was some other path to God and the fullness of life in his kingdom.

Then something happened. Saul met the Risen Jesus on the road to Damascus and he was changed, transformed forever. Jesus had chosen Saul, he had called him. In doing so, he made him righteous or justified him and gave him a share in his glory.

Jesus called Saul by name. There is something powerful in this. In Hebrew understanding the name is not merely a label but it reveals something of the identity and presence of the one named. This, for example, helps us comprehend why it is forbidden for the Jewish people to pronounce the name of God. This is why we can say, "At the name of Jesus, every knee shall bow, every tongue confess that He is Lord." Saul discovered that Jesus knew him and knew his identity and had chosen him. In calling him, he gave him a new identity – he was no longer to be Saul but Paul.

What had Jesus called Saul to?

During his lifetime, Jesus had shared a parable in which a King had prepared a magnificent feast, a sumptuous banquet. The king had stood at the door of the palace, inviting those passing by to enter in, saying, "Come in, everything is prepared." Jesus was calling Saul to enter that feast, to enter the kingdom of God, to be saved or "made righteous", justified. All Saul had to do was to decide to enter then that door, by faith, and he would be saved and share in the glory of Jesus at that beautiful celebration of life.

By saying "yes", in faith, Saul had responded to the call of Christ. In so doing, he appropriated the salvation offered him by God and came to share in the glory of Christ. Whereas previously, according to the Law, we had *sin-conversion-salvation* (convert, turn back - *shub* in Hebrew - and you will be saved), now we have *sin-salvation-conversion* (convert, take a step forwards into the Kingdom, and salvation will be yours).

What is the difference? Why has the situation changed? The answer is Jesus Christ, the Lord. He is the one who makes all the difference, he is the offer of salvation, he is God who comes to us and invites us to follow him into the eternal banquet and the joys of the Kingdom. By his life, death and resurrection - that which we call the 'Paschal mystery' - Jesus has opened for us the door to eternal life. The way to enter through that door is by faith in him.

In our second reading this weekend, we hear these words which Paul addressed to the early Christian community in Rome:

*He called those he intended for this [to become true images of his Son]; those he called he justified, and with those he justified he shared his glory.*

The same God is calling you, is saving or justifying you and is sharing with you his glory. How is all of this possible? The answer is Jesus Christ the Lord.

The further question remains, however. Do you believe this? Are you willing to take a step forward in faith?

Maybe you would like to say this prayer, making the words your own:

*"Take Lord and receive all my liberty, my memory, my understanding and my entire will, all that I have and possess. You have given all to me. To you Lord I return it. All is yours. Do with me what you will. Give me only your love and your grace. That is enough for me."* (St. Ignatius of Loyola).

# ST PETER'S CHURCH IS NOW OPEN FOR MASS

St Peter's church is now open for some public Masses and open a few hours a day for prayer

The public Masses, which will require booking, are as follows:

**Saturday** 5.30 (vigil Mass)  
**Sunday** 12 noon (and open for prayer afterwards till 2pm)  
**Sunday** 5.30pm

The livestreamed masses, not open to the public, will continue at 7pm Sat and Sun, 10am on Sunday. See p 8 for the full timetable of all masses.

## PRAYER AND WEEKDAY MASSES

St. Peter's is open for a couple of hours each day, including public mass and time for private prayer and adoration. These are the times:

**Monday** Adoration and prayer 11-2, with Mass at 12.15pm  
**Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday** Mass at 10, prayer and adoration till 12.  
**Friday** Adoration and prayer 11-2, with Mass at 12.15pm  
**Saturday** 9am Mass, prayer till 12, with confessions from 11-12; & 4.30-5 (vigil Mass also at 5.30pm)

**You should only come to church if it is right for you.**

At present, only St Peter's of our four churches can open, and unfortunately we cannot offer any toilet facilities, as the Pastoral Centre must remain closed. (The nearest facilities are at the Discovery Centre across the street, other toilets open in Winchester are at St Maurice's Covert ie beside Debenhams and Abbey Garden.) We are happy to be back!

You can also do it from the homepage of the website, where the link is clear and easy. <https://www.catholicwinchester.org.uk/> You will be asked for name and phone number and how many tickets you are booking. The information is for our 'track and trace' obligation, but will be used only for that purpose (unless you want to be on our mailing list). Your name will be added to the list, and when you turn up at church the volunteer stewards will check you off. You do not need to print off the ticket. There is, obviously, no charge! If you cannot make a booking, and have no-one else to do it for you, then phone the office 01962 852804 and ask for help. If you find you cannot come after all, please let us know (even late on), as your place can be offered to someone else.

This is very new to us too, so please bear with us if we have teething problems. Let us know if you have any issues.

**Fr Tom's** big news is that he is to retire this summer, but we are delighted that he will still be around, and he is happy to be back saying masses.

**Bishop Peter Doyle** is happily settled in Alresford and looking forward to being able to celebrate masses with a congregation as lockdown eases. He is enjoying retirement.

**Canon Peter** is in good health and coping well with lockdown. He is very appreciative of the care shown by the regular visitors looking out for him.

We asked **Fr Stephen** about his lockdown, and he said 'I enjoyed lockdown when very few vehicles were on the road and when you went for a walk it was less crowded and no one was rushing around. People seemed much more calmer and more reflective. But it was also very concerning as to how much the virus might spread and how many might die from it.'

**Deacons Gerard and Martin** have been working exceptionally hard and looking after their families.

**Sr Mary Frances**, reporting from the convent at Medstead, says all the sisters continue to be well. Not too much has changed for them since we last heard from them, but they are very pleased that just recently, they have been able to have their Parish Priest visit the convent to say Mass for their community. Sr Mary Frances was very interested to know what has been happening in our parish and sends everyone very best wishes.

At the time of writing, most of our staff are still on furlough, or reduced hours. Please keep them all in your thoughts and prayers.

### CANDLE-LIGHTING IN ST PETER'S

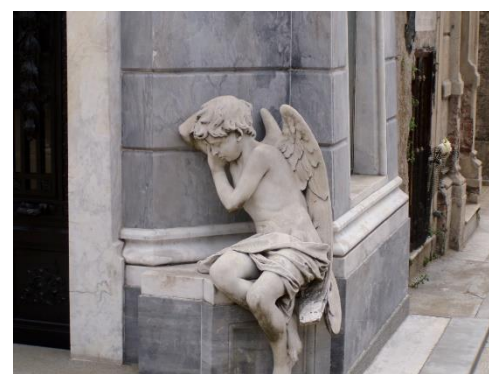


For the last couple of months, Fr Mark, assisted by Fr Stephen, has been lighting candles before the 7pm Mass and praying for people's intentions during the Mass. He would then photograph the candles and put the picture and names up on Facebook. Whether you made a request for a loved one, or just admired the various geometric candle arrangements or arty shots of the church – we know this has been much appreciated. Now that the church is open for several hours a day, and people can either light the candles themselves or ask a friend to do so, we are going to reduce the frequency of Fr Mark's candle-lighting, and do it once a week. So you can most certainly still ask for a candle, but bear in mind it might be a few days later, and will not necessarily be on, for example, an anniversary. We'll continue doing them daily for the next week, but after that (from 1<sup>st</sup> August) it will be once a week.

Well, what a year! This academic year for me meant returning to my Christchurch school, then back to St Peter's as its substantive headteacher, only to find 9 weeks into the job we were closing to all but key worker children due to a pandemic. I think all of us went through every single emotion possible throughout this time and no one had the answers. In such times, many of us would usually turn to the Church and our faith - but even going to our churches was not physically possible. It was a time when we had to react immediately to government advice, support those around us - children, staff and families - and try to figure out the best way forward. We needed to be continually reflective of what we were doing but also mindful of all the guidance that was being delivered..... and all the time dealing with our own personal lives and families.

I need to thank so many people for their hard work, dedication and support as we continued to take St Peter's forward, improving the school, and so providing the education our children deserve..... along with making our way through COVID.

I begin with Mrs Hutchins, my right-hand woman, with whom I've worried, laughed (albeit hysterically at times) and planned our reaction to lockdown, the various returns of pupils and school improvement. It would have been a very different experience for me without her able assistance. Thank you to my staff, the leadership team, teachers and teaching assistants who worked on many various school improvement projects when at home and looked after the children at school so well. Thank you to my office team - who have been so patient with my requests and then that of the bureaucracy demanded from the government. Then to the premises team who have had to adapt and become an essential component to us remaining safe. Our school kitchen staff, many of them new to the team, have had to work out how to provide food to the children to comply with the risk assessments and to provide weekly hampers to some of our families - all new ways of working.

Throughout this time Caroline Ricketts and her Little Fishes team have shown real concern and care for their children and families. I also need to thank them for all they have done.

Mrs Backhouse and the governors have been so supportive of the school throughout this time, along with providing the required challenge for St Peter's to continue to improve. Finally, I would like to thank Father Mark. He is the only parish priest I know of, through conversations with colleague Catholic heads, who visited their school each week, leading us in liturgy and supporting us pastorally. He also seemed to have an endless supply of cream eggs which were appreciated by all.

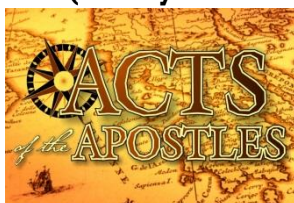
