TAKING STEPS TO GROW IN FAITH

Fr Mark writes ...

Staying Power I – Discipleship and Taking STEPS to Grow in Faith

How good are you at keeping New Year's Resolutions? I'm rubbish! Despite the best intentions, I so often find the even better excuses why not to do what I committed to doing. Commitments, and excuses for not keeping them are all a part of life and the tension between the two never completely disappears. Marriage, family, work...

Church can fall into that category too...Spiritual commitments are a part of life as well. At least they can be, & we would argue that they should be. We are beginning a brand new series of homilies today that we are calling **Staying Power**.

In essence, this whole series wants to say this:

We grow spiritually by the commitments we make

This is a series about how to grow in your faith and as a follower of Jesus Christ, and the commitments we want to help you make in order to do that.

But, you might be thinking, "I'm already committed, in fact I'm *over* committed. Why would I want to add any *more* commitments? Why does spiritual growth matter anyway? I believe in God, I go to Church...most of the time. I pray, when I think of it: I'm a good person."

Our argument will be this: without a commitment to growing spiritually, you're actually depriving yourself, and others around you.

Spiritual growth empowers you to discern your calling and purpose and to accomplish what God has created you to do. **Spiritual growth** enables you to become the best version of you, the person God created you to be, the person you want to be.

Spiritual growth encourages you to love the people around you the way you want to love them but often fail to. **Spiritual growth** allows you to love and care for yourself in a way that is healthy and helpful.

In fact, your most important objective in life could be to grow spiritually. That's why we should be open *to*, and interested *in*, **spiritual growth**.

But...being open to growth is not enough. There's a second part. And the second part is the crucial part. Anyone can be *open* to growth, but to actually grow you have to make a commitment.

That's why we're calling this series "Staying Power".

Staying Power is absolutely necessary for spiritual growth because there are obstacles to growing spiritually. Everything in the world feels more important, more urgent, more real than your spiritual life. Everything gets in the way of you making any kind of spiritual commitment. Everything will conspire against that commitment: work, children, sports, family obligations, TV, Facebook...

And the rest of the world doesn't really support, much less encourage your spiritual growth. Every day we're inundated with information and encouragement, urging us to lose weight, get in shape, buy that new car, buy into that new style...Nobody is encouraging you to grow spiritually.

Besides, it takes time. In the same way that you can't accomplish anything worthwhile quickly, there is no microwaving your spiritual maturity. There are no shortcuts or silver bullets to becoming the person God created you to be, the best version of you.

Spiritual maturity requires faithfulness, perseverance and staying power.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is telling a parable to the religious leaders who were opposing him.

Jesus began to speak to the chief priests and elders of the people in parables: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding.

Often we don't want to commit to spiritual exercises, because they have been made to seem dour and depressing. Sometimes we may have experienced them as boring and bad. This was never how Jesus described life with God. Instead he chose to compare the spiritual life to a party.

One of the tough things in these times of COVID is how parties, celebrations, including weddings and baptisms, are being squeezed small or put on hold. For many, they understandably want all their family and friends to be able to join them for these joyous occasions. The same was true in Jesus's time. People usually made them a priority, and were usually willing to travel and spend a lot of money to be a part of one when invited.

A wedding feast thrown by a king would obviously be the grandest kind of affair in the life of the community, and everyone would want to be included. So, when Jesus sets up this story, the image is of a dazzling and irresistible opportunity, one that anyone would do anything to be a part of. But that's not happens. We are told:

He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come.

It's important to recognize just how unlikely the scenarios described in most of these parables would be. They're so unlikely, that those listening to them would have laughed out loud.

Anyway, the king refuses to take "no" for an answer:

Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited" he said "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding."

There is going to be the finest steak and vegan delights aplenty, sushi stations, the best wine and whisky you can imagine, an amazing location, an A-list celebrity guest list. It will be the wedding of the century. You don't want to miss it. But...

But they were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them.

This is an absurd story, of course, and Jesus is summing up the history of Israel and how they had historically ignored God's incredible invitation and mistreated God's prophets. The story continues: the king, undeterred with this ingratitude and hostility, perseveres in his desire to throw a great party for his son and fill his party with guests, says:

"The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out on to the roads and collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and the wedding hall was filled with guests.

Those invited were not worthy to come because they ignored and rejected the invitation. They made themselves unworthy by their indifference and hostility to the invitation. In order to fill the feast, the servants go out and invite anyone they can find. They bring in both good and bad alike. They do not discriminate.

So the good news is that the party is finally filled - but then there's a twist in the story and a turn of events.

When the king came in to look at the guests he noticed one man who was not wearing a wedding garment, and said to him, "How did you get in here, my friend, without a wedding garment?" And the man was silent.

The implication here is that the king not only would have provided the feast for his guests, but would have also provided clothes, a bit like wedding favours. This was sometimes a custom, even among the elite. But it would have been necessary for the guests at *this* banquet since they were brought in directly from the streets. Evidently, this one particular guest refused to put on the new garment. And so the parable ends sadly:

Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot and throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."

I guess you could say he's been uninvited to the party. Just because the king didn't like the way he was dressed? No, because he refused to put in any effort whatsoever to participate in the feast. He refused to commit to the party in even the simplest way possible, by simply changing his clothes.

He came as a consumer, without commitment.
And without any commitment, he doesn't really belong at the banquet.

You can come to the party as a consumer.
You just can't stay that way.

God invites us to be a part of his kingdom on earth, to be a part of what he is already doing. He even offers us the grace we need to accept the invitation and grow spiritually.

BUT, grace is not opposed to effort; in fact, it builds on our effort. Grace builds on nature, perfecting and fulfilling it.

As a Church, we want to help you do what you can do to live as a follower of Christ.
So, over the next few weeks we are going to look at the commitments we think are vital for spiritual growth.
Those spiritual commitments are:

Serving,
Trusting,
Engaging in a small or medium-sized group,
Prayer and the sacraments and
Sharing your faith.

STEPS

These are commitments we want to help you to make and keep in order to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ, and we're going to be talking more about each of these steps over the course of this series. They're steps which we're all invited, and all need, to take.

But, not all at once: it's a step-by-step process, and in no particular order. And each of these steps will open you up to receive God's gifts and grace even more.

But really the only step we want you to take today is to commit to this series.

Please commit to this series. If you are not going to be here in person, make sure to join us online. The message will appear here in the newsletter every week, and Fr Mark will share it as his homily over these weeks, which you can always find on "catch up" online if you miss it, so its super easy to keep that commitment.

We're all invited to the party.
And you can come as you are.
You're just not supposed to stay that way.
You're supposed to grow.

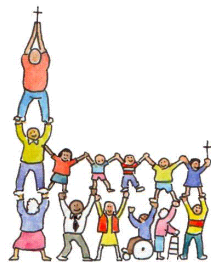
First Holy Communion

This Week's Intention Let us pray for the young people preparing to receive the Lord in Holy Communion for the first time, that they may be filled with lifelong gratitude and reverence for His precious body and blood.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament - 'ADORATION'

Since lockdown, Fr Mark and Fr Stephen have led times of prayer, including Adoration, both in the morning and at night which are available to follow on our YouTube channel <https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCbGgrcbDyLY75pmCAopfLlg/live>. The re-opening of St Peter's Church further enabled us to extend Adoration, which now also takes place after Mass, Mondays to Saturdays and can be attended in person.

What is Adoration?

Understood simply, Eucharistic Adoration is adoring or honouring the Eucharistic Presence of Christ. At the moment of Consecration, during the Mass, the "gifts" of bread and wine are transformed into the actual Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, at the Altar. This means that they are not only spiritually transformed, but rather are actually (substantially) transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. They become the actual, physical presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, His Real Presence, even if the 'accidents' persist (i.e. our eyes still see bread and wine).

When we come to Adoration, we come to adore the Blessed Sacrament (Sacred Host). We come to adore Jesus! As we "pray, watch, wait, listen" to Him, we start to grow spiritually. Through our Adoration, Jesus calls us to a personal relationship with Him (friendship). Through this friendship, we are inspired and strengthened to take on life's challenges, to carry our daily cross with a new attitude, and to become more and more like Jesus.

Come for as little or as long as you would like. **Times this week are:**

8am – 9am, Monday to Friday (starting with Morning Prayer)

After 12.15 Mass, Monday & Friday until 2pm

After 10am Mass Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday until 12pm

After 12noon Mass, Sunday until 2pm

After 9am Mass, Saturday until 12pm (Confessions, 11am-12pm)

(ON SAT 10TH, & USUALLY ON SATURDAYS, BUT NOT SAT 17TH)

St. Peter's School Catch-up

Our New Art Curriculum

Following on from last week's Wednesday letter and Year 3's art, Year 4 have been thinking all things Anglo-Saxon. From answering the question of why the Anglo-Saxons invaded Britain to creating their own Anglo-Saxon sculptures. Our first step was to investigate what Anglo-Saxon buildings looked like. We used thin pens and permanent markers to experiment with different types of line while representing different Anglo-Saxon buildings from images. Once we had done this, it was time to move on to sculpting! We practised outside using natural materials before moving our sculpting inside. Year 4 enjoyed using wood, wire, plasticine, raffia, hessian and many other materials to form their Anglo Saxon sculptures. We had the opportunity to use a saw, wire cutters and a cool temperature glue gun – a first for many of us! Year 4 have really enjoyed being able to share this work with their friends and families – thank you to anyone who came to our gallery.

Emilia said, "It was fun getting the things we needed and putting it all together."

Iris said, "It was good to work as part of a group and share our ideas. We also got to use wire cutters for the first time."

Daniel said, "It was really creative. My group wanted to use all the materials we had like wool, sticks, plasticine and straw."

Kyhan said, "I liked using the tools like the saw and wire cutters. We wanted to build our Anglo-Saxon house by putting the sticks horizontally."
